Rube Johnston Bluebird Trail 2023 – Fall Report

Fledged Birds: Mountain Bluebirds 20 in four boxes, Tree Swallows 256 in 56 boxes

Nest Boxes Disturbed by Other Species: House Wren 8, House Sparrow 1, Mouse nests 10.

I checked the boxes on Sept. 5 to Sept. 9, 2023. This was later than usual due to all the wildfire smoke. Consequently, I found more than the usual late Deer Mice nesting in the boxes.

Mountain Bluebirds (MB) nested in four boxes this year, with one clutch in each box, for a total of 20 fledglings. The first male was seen on April 4, near Box J1. I am still finding low nest box use by Mountain Bluebirds across the trail. Box J1 also had a TS nest started but not used, after the MB finished.

Tree Swallows (TS) initiated nests in 56 boxes. TS observed at most boxes by April 29. TS egg laying was delayed at least three weeks, due to cool and dry weather, causing a lack of insects. There were 20 dead hatchlings and 11 non-viable eggs. Seven nests were abandoned for unknown reasons, likely a lack of insect food. One box was taken over by House Sparrows. All House Wren disturbance consisted of piles of twigs, after TS had finished.

Roeben Test Boxes (horizontal design): TS nested in all three boxes Box SR3, at the VWF shooting range had 4 TS fledged. Box R10 had 5 and Box R19 had 4 TS fledged. Egg laying was late, sometime after July 6. As in previous years, the TS parents cover the full floor with nest grass, not only at the back. But I saw no evidence of two females nesting. Included with this report are end of season photos of these boxes.

Maintenance:

As I worked along the trail, I re-marked all box identifiers, and tightened fence post screws.

Mileage and Time: Spring 125 miles/200 km, 6 hours. Fall 125 miles/200 km, 12 hours.

Total: 250 miles/400 km, 18 hours worked.
